This brochure is designed to provide the public with information and a summary of regulations pertaining to hunting and other recreational use on the Everglades and Francis S. Taylor Wildlife Management Area. **Regulations that are new or differ substantially from last year are shown in bold print.** Area users should familiarize themselves with all regulations. For exact wording of the wildlife laws and regulations, see the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's wildlife code, on file with the Secretary of State and state libraries. This brochure, the Florida Hunting Regulations handbook, and quota permit worksheets should provide the information necessary for you to plan your hunting activities. These publications are available from any Commission office, county tax collector and at MyFWC.com.

Persons using wildlife management areas are required to have appropriate licenses, permits and stamps. The following persons are exempt from all license and permit requirements (except for quota permits when listed as "no exemptions," recreational use permits, antlerless deer permits and the Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp [federal duck stamp]): Florida residents who are 65 years of age or older; residents who possess a Florida Resident Disabled Person Hunting and Fishing Certificate; residents in the U.S. Armed Forces, not stationed in Florida, while home on leave for 30 days or less, upon submission of orders; and children under 16 years of age. Children under 16 years of age are exempt from the federal duck stamp. Anyone born on or after June 1, 1975 and 16 years of age or older must have passed a Commission-approved hunter-safety course prior to being issued a hunting license, except the Hunter Safety Mentoring exemption allows anyone to purchase a hunting license and hunt under the supervision of a licensed hunter, 21 years of age or older, for one year.

Hunting, trapping and fishing licenses, and management area, archery, muzzleloading gun, wild turkey and state waterfowl permits may be purchased from county tax collectors, license agents, at MyFWC.com/license or by telephone at 1-888-486-8356. A no-cost Migratory Bird Permit is available when purchasing a hunting license. Any waterfowl hunter 16 years of age or older must possess a federal duck stamp; available where hunting licenses are sold, at most post offices or at duckstamp.com. Americans with Disabilities Act accessibility information is available at MyFWC.com/ADA.

QUOTA PERMIT INFORMATION:

General Gun-Vehicle - 24 (general gun-vehicle track permits; Conservation Area 3A North), 79 (general gun-vehicle airboat permits; Francis S. Taylor WMA and Conservation Areas 3A South and 2), no-cost, general gun-vehicle permits with 1 antlered deer tag (no exemptions, non-transferable, except that a general gun-vehicle permit and tag shall only be transferred in the field by Commission law enforcement supervisors or their designees when a tracked vehicle becomes inoperable and unable to be repaired while within the wildlife management area to which the tracked vehicle is assigned). Note: These numbers reflect the number of quota permits issued during the 08-09 season. The total number of quota permits issued for the 09-10 season may change based on population surveys, water levels, habitat conditions, and other variables.

Permit applications: Hunters must submit electronic applications for quota and special-opportunity permits through the Commission's Total Licensing System (TLS) at a license agent, county tax collector's office or MyFWC.com. Worksheets listing hunts, application periods, deadlines and instructions are available at county tax collector's offices, FWC offices or MyFWC.com. The first quota application period begins June 1 and worksheets will be available about two weeks prior.

GENERAL AREA REGULATIONS:

All general laws and regulations relating to wild animal life or freshwater aquatic life shall apply unless specifically exempted for this area. Hunting or the taking of wildlife or fish on this area shall be allowed only during the open seasons and in accordance with the following regulations:

1. Any person hunting deer or accompanying another person hunting deer shall wear at least 500 square inches of daylight fluorescent-orange material as an outer garment, above the waistline. This is not required during an archery-only season.
2. Taking of spotted fawn, swimming deer or roosted turkey is prohibited. Species legal to take are listed under each season.
3. It is illegal to hunt over bait or place any bait or other food for wildlife on this area.
4. Driving a metal object into any tree, or hunting from a tree into which a metal object has been driven, is prohibited.
5. No person shall cut, damage or remove any natural, man-made or cultural resource without written authorization of the landowner or primary land manager.
6. Taking or attempting to take any game with the aid of live decoys, recorded game calls or sounds, set guns, artificial light, net, trap, snare, drug or poison is prohibited.
7. The wanton and willful waste of wildlife is prohibited.
8. Hunting, fishing or trapping is prohibited on any portion of the area posted as "CLOSED" to those activities.
9. People, dogs, vehicles and other recreational equipment are prohibited in areas posted as "Closed to Public Access" by FWC administrative action.
10. Taking or herding wildlife from any motorized vehicle, aircraft or boat which is under power is prohibited, until power and movement from that power, has ceased, except statewide alligator harvest program permittees that are attempting to take alligators.
11. Most game may be hunted from one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset (see exceptions under each season).
12. The release of any animal is prohibited, without written authorization of the landowner or primary land manager.
13. The head and evidence of sex may not be removed from the carcass of any deer or turkey on the area.
14. The planting or introduction of any non-native plant is prohibited, without written authorization of the landowner or primary land manager.
15. Wild hog may not be transported alive.

16. It is unlawful for any person to leave any garbage or refuse or in any way litter in the area.
17. It is unlawful to set fire to any forest, grass or woodlands. Fires other than campfires are prohibited.
18. A Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Law Enforcement Officer may search any camp, vehicle or boat, in accordance with law.
19. The construction of docks of any type is prohibited.

PUBLIC ACCESS AND VEHICLES:

1. Open to public access year-round.
2. Motorized vehicles are prohibited on all levees except for the L-4 and L-5 levees.
3. During the general gun vehicle season, only those vehicles and airboats authorized by non-transferable general gun-vehicle permits are allowed in Conservation Area 3A North during legal shooting hours, except that frogging, by airboat only, is allowed from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise.
4. During the archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons, all-terrain vehicles are allowed but only for the purpose of hunting. All other vehicles are prohibited, except: 1) vehicles are allowed on levees and 2) during the second general gun-walk season, other vehicles and vessels are allowed in Conservation Area 3A North outside of that portion of the area between the Old Miami Canal (Mud Canal) and the New Miami Canal.
5. All-terrain vehicle access for scouting is allowed only during the two weeks prior to the archery season and one week prior to the muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons. During the remainder of the year, all-terrain vehicles are prohibited.
6. During the archery, muzzleloading gun, and the first general gun-walk seasons, airboats are prohibited in Conservation Area 3A North during legal shooting hours. Hunting equipment may be transported on boats (other than airboats) and all-terrain vehicles.
7. **Due to construction, the L-6 levee is closed to public access and there will be no walk-in access into Conservation Area 2A for the 2009-2010 season.**
8. Persons participating in the statewide alligator harvest program may operate airboats throughout the area.
9. While an all-terrain vehicle is in motion, no person shall occupy any platform or structure attached to it. No all-terrain vehicle may be equipped with a steering mechanism that would enable the all-terrain vehicle to be operated from a platform or structure attached to it.
10. Parked vehicles may not obstruct a road, gate or firelane.
11. Vehicles and airboats are prohibited on tree islands, wildlife islands, tree strands and between Old Miami Canal (Mud Canal) and New Miami Canal.
12. No motor vehicle shall be operated on any part of any wildlife management area that has been designated as closed to vehicular traffic.
13. No vessel shall be operated outside of Water Management District canals unless it is equipped with an orange rectangular flag at least 10 inches wide and 12 inches long and displayed at a minimum height of 10 feet above the bottom of the vessel.
14. No person shall operate any all-terrain vehicle, motorized two-wheeled vehicle or motorized three-wheeled vehicle unless it is equipped with an orange rectangular flag at least 10 inches wide and 12 inches long and displayed at a minimum height of 6 feet above the top of the seat.
15. Commercial recreational activities, such as but not limited to airboat rides, guide services or other tourist services, are prohibited in Conservation Area 3A South west of the Miami Canal, unless authorized by the Miccosukee Tribe, which has the exclusive right to provide such services in the Leased Area.

HUNTERS AND CHECK STATIONS:

1. Hunting equipment and dogs may be taken onto the WMA after 8 a.m. the day before the opening of a season and shall be removed by 6 p.m. one day after the end of the season.
2. During the general gun-vehicle season, all deer taken shall be tagged immediately with the antlered deer tag provided by the Commission.
3. On Saturdays and Sundays during the archery, muzzleloading gun, general gun-walk and general gun-vehicle seasons, no deer or wild hog shall be dismembered or removed from the area until checked at a manned check station.
4. Deer may be dismembered in the field or camp, after being checked at a check station, but each portion shall have a tag affixed to it identifying the name, address and hunting license number of the person who killed it; the date and location at which it was taken; and shall be readily traceable to the portion of the animal bearing the sex identification.

GUNS:

1. Hunting or the display or use of a gun in a manner capable of taking wildlife on or from the L-4, L-5 or L-39 (Hillsboro Canal) levees or the rights-of-way of S.R. 84, U.S. 41 or U.S. 27 is prohibited.
2. All firearms shall be securely encased and in a vehicle, vessel, camper or tent, during periods when they are not a legal method of take. Persons in possession of a valid Concealed Weapon or Firearm License may carry concealed handguns.
3. Target practice is prohibited.
4. Hunting with a gun and light is prohibited.
5. Muzzleloading guns used for taking deer must be .40 caliber or larger, if firing a single bullet, or be 20 gauge or larger if firing two or more balls.
6. Children under the age of 16 may not be in possession of a firearm unless in the presence of a supervising adult.
7. No person shall have a gun under control while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
8. For hunting non-migratory game, only shotguns, rifles, pistols, longbows (including compound and recurve bows), crossbows (during the general gun and small game seasons or by permit) or falconry may be used.
9. For hunting migratory game, only shotguns, bow and arrow (not crossbows), and falconry may be used. Shotguns shall not be larger than 10 gauge and shall be incapable of holding more than three shells in the magazine and chamber combined.
10. Firearms using rimfire or non-expanding, full metal jacket (military ball) ammunition are prohibited for taking deer.
11. Fully automatic or silencer-equipped firearms, centerfire semi-automatic rifles having a magazine capable of holding more than five rounds, explosive or drug-injecting devices and setguns are prohibited.

DOGS:

1. Hunting with dogs is prohibited, except during the general gun-vehicle season, and retrievers are allowed when waterfowl is legal to take.
2. Dogs may be trained in Francis S. Taylor WMA October 3-12. Harvesting wildlife with a gun is prohibited while training.
3. No person shall allow any dog to pursue or molest any wildlife during any period in which the taking of wildlife by the use of dogs is prohibited.
4. Dogs on leashes may be used for trailing wounded game.
5. For purposes other than hunting, dogs are allowed, but must be kept under physical restraint at all times.

CAMPING:

1. Camping equipment may be taken onto the area no earlier than 7 days prior to the archery season and all vehicles, camps, tents, other camping equipment and litter shall be removed by 6 p.m. 7 days after the close of general gun-vehicle season. During the remainder of the year, camping is allowed only on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, and camps may not be left unattended for more than 24 hours.
2. Camping is prohibited in areas posted as closed to camping.
3. The erection of any permanent structure is prohibited.
4. Only tents, trailers or self-propelled camping vehicles may be used for camping.

BAG AND POSSESSION LIMITS:

1. Deer - Archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons: Season limit 1. General gun-vehicle season: One per antlered deer tag.
2. Turkey - Prohibited.
3. Wild hog - Archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons: Daily limit 1, annual limit 2 (all seasons combined), possession limit 2. During the general gun-vehicle season the daily limit is 1 per vehicle.
4. Gray squirrel, quail and rabbit - Daily limit 12, possession limit 24 for each game species.
5. Raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk and nutria - No bag limits.
6. Bobcat and otter - Possession limit 1 unless in possession of a Trapping License.
7. Migratory birds (except mourning dove and white-winged dove) - See Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet.

ARCHERY SEASON:

August 29 through September 20 (Conservation Area 3A North only).
Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Hunting license, management area permit, archery permit, and migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds).
Legal to Take - Deer with at least one antler having 2 or more points (each point 1-inch or more in length) and at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog with shoulder height of 15 inches or more, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria and migratory birds in season (except mourning dove and white-winged dove).

Regulations Unique to Archery Season - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

1. Hunting with firearms or crossbows is prohibited, except that centerfire shotguns are allowed for hunting migratory birds when one or more species are legal to take (see Migratory Bird section and the current Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet).
2. All-terrain vehicles are allowed, but only for the purpose of hunting. All other vehicles are prohibited, except on levees.
3. Airboats are prohibited in Conservation Areas 3A North during legal shooting hours.
4. Hunting equipment may be transported on boats (other than airboats) and all-terrain vehicles.

MUZZLELOADING GUN SEASON:

October 3-18 (Conservation Area 3A North only).

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Hunting license, management area permit, muzzleloading gun permit and migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds).

Legal to Take - Deer with at least one antler having 2 or more points (each point 1-inch or more in length) and at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog with shoulder height of 15 inches or more, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria and migratory birds in season (except mourning dove and white-winged dove).

Regulations Unique to Muzzleloading Gun Season - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

1. Only muzzleloading guns are allowed for hunting, except that centerfire shotguns are allowed for hunting migratory birds when one or more species are legal to take (see Migratory Bird section and the current Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet).
2. All-terrain vehicles are allowed, but only for the purpose of hunting. All other vehicles are prohibited, except on levees.
3. Airboats are prohibited in Conservation Areas 3A North during legal shooting hours.
4. Hunting equipment may be transported on boats (other than airboats) and all-terrain vehicles.

GENERAL GUN-WALK SEASON:

October 24 through November 1 (Conservation Areas 3A North only).

December 5 through January 3 (Conservation Area 3A North between Old Miami Canal and New Miami Canal only).

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Hunting license, management area permit and migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds).

Legal to Take - Deer with at least one antler having 2 or more points (each point 1-inch or more in length) and at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog with a shoulder height of 15 inches or more, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria and migratory birds in season (except mourning dove and white-winged dove). Bobcat and otter beginning December 1.

Regulations Unique to General Gun-Walk Season - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

1. All-terrain vehicles are allowed, but only for the purpose of hunting. All other vehicles are prohibited, except on levees.
2. During the first general gun walk season, airboats are prohibited in Conservation Areas 3A North during legal shooting hours.
3. Hunting equipment may be transported on boats (other than airboats) and all-terrain vehicles.
4. **Due to construction, there will be no walk-in access into Conservation Area 2A for the 2009-2010 season.**

GENERAL GUN-VEHICLE SEASON:

November 7-22 (Conservation Areas 3A North, 3A South, and 2; and Francis S. Taylor only).

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Quota permit (unless hunting waterfowl by airboat), antlered deer tag (to take deer), hunting license, management area permit, migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds), and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

Legal to Take - Deer with at least one antler having 2 or more points (each point 1-inch or more in length) and at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog with a shoulder height of 15 inches or more, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria, and migratory birds in season (except mourning dove and white-winged dove).

Regulations Unique to General Gun-Vehicle Season - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

1. Hunting with dogs is allowed.
2. All deer taken shall be tagged immediately with the antlered deer tag provided by the Commission.
3. Walk hunting is prohibited.

4. Only those vehicles and airboats authorized by Everglades general gun-vehicle permits are allowed in Conservation Area 3A North during legal shooting hours. **Vehicles (other than all-terrain vehicles) and airboats may be used in Conservation Areas 3A South, 2A, 2B, and Francis S. Taylor. All-terrain vehicles are prohibited.**

SMALL GAME SEASON:

November 23 through March 7.

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Hunting license, management area permit, migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds), and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

Legal to Take - Gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria and migratory birds in season (except mourning dove and white-winged dove). Bobcat and otter - December 1 through March 1.

Regulations Unique to Small Game Season - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

1. Hunting with retrievers is allowed when waterfowl is legal to take.
2. Hunting with centerfire rifles is prohibited.
3. Airboats are allowed.
4. ATVs are prohibited.

TRAPPING: Prohibited.

MIGRATORY BIRD SEASONS:

Duck, geese, coot, rail, common moorhen, woodcock, crow and snipe may be hunted during seasons established by the Commission for these species (See Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet).

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Hunting license, management area permit, migratory bird permit, and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

Legal to Take - See Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet, except hunting mourning dove and white-winged dove is prohibited.

Regulations Unique to Migratory Bird Seasons - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

1. Hunting with retrievers is allowed during waterfowl season.
2. Hunting duck, geese and coot with lead shot is prohibited.
3. Centerfire shotguns are allowed for hunting during established area seasons when one or more migratory birds are legal to take.

FISHING AND FROGGING:

Allowed year-round, except during the general gun-vehicle season when frogging in Conservation Area 3A North is allowed by airboat only and only from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise.

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Fishing license (not required when frogging).

Legal to Take - See Florida Freshwater Fishing Regulations Summary.

Regulations Unique to Fishing and Frogging - All General Area Regulations and General Freshwater Fishing Regulations shall apply. Shooting frogs is allowed only during the listed open hunting seasons and only with the legal methods of take during each particular season.







