White-fronted Parrot *Amazona albifrons*

The White-fronted Parrot, or Amazon, is native to western Mexico, south into Costa Rica, and has been present south Florida (Broward, Dade, and Monroe counties) since the early 1970s (Robertson and Woolfenden 1992), the result of escapes or deliberate releases. Nesting has been reported in Dade County, but there is no indication that the species is established in the wild (Stevenson and Anderson 1994). During the Atlas period a single "possible" was reported in Miami a bird paired for several years with a *Red-lore Parrot*.
