Employee Introductions**

Division of Law Enforcement

Officer Adonious Duhart [pronounced A-DON-E-US, DOO-HART] - Officer Duhart has been a FWC Law Enforcement Officer in the Southwest Region for eight years. He is a member of the Agency's Honor Guard and has attended the state and national memorials representing FWC on numerous occasions. Officer Duhart is also involved with the Agency's Training Section where he excels in many areas of high liability training including firearms instructor. Officer Duhart is extremely versatile as a patrol officer working on cases involving boating under the influence, illegal hunting and fishing violations along with accident investigations. He served in the United States Army for more than 10 years prior to pursuing his career with the FWC.

Angie Stoliker [pronounced STA-LI-KER] - Angie has a total of 28 years of service with the State of Florida, of which 22 years have been with the Division of Law Enforcement (DLE). Ms. Stoliker has worked as a Hunter Education Staff Assistant, Duty Officer Supervisor, and Operations & Management Consultant (OMC) for the Southwest Region. In this position, Angie serves as a subject matter expert for budget, purchasing and administrative issues. Although Angie's primary duties are to assist the Aviation Section, she also works with the Southwest regional office service center, providing budget and administrative support.

Fish and Wildlife Research Institute

Andy Garrett - Andy serves as a Research Administrator I within the FWRI Marine Mammal Research Program where he has been an integral member of the program since 1999. He serves as the State of Florida Manatee rescue coordinator and is nationally and internationally recognized for his expertise in manatee capture techniques. His unique skills and abilities have supported numerous research efforts that required on-water captures. He advances capture techniques, transport and equipment designs, and has trained dozens of stranding partners---all of that has vastly improved the marine mammal stranding network. Andy holds a B.S. degree in Marine Science, specializing in biology, from Eckerd College.

Division of Hunting and Game Management

Jason Burton - Jason is the Southwest Region Public Hunting Area Biologist. He is originally from east Tennessee and earned his Master's degree in Wildlife Ecology from Mississippi State University. Jason works closely with staff, cooperators, stakeholders, and the general public on a wide variety of issues pertaining to hunting and public lands. He has been key in the development of new wildlife management areas and hunting opportunities in the Southwest Region. Jason also serves on the Southwest Regional Leadership Team, Deer Management Standing Team and Nuisance Wildlife Team.

John Weatherholt - Over twenty years ago, John started as a volunteer hunter safety instructor in Orlando. For the past fourteen years, he has served as the FWC's Southwest Regional Hunter Safety Coordinator. John works closely with volunteers in the hunter safety program and oversees three of the FWC's public shooting ranges. He is the regional coordinator for the Emergency Response Team for non-sworn employees. On April 1st, John received a Polk County Sheriff's Commendation for his assistance with the Bustin' Clays Charity Shoot at FWC's Tenoroc Shooting Range; during this event they threw over 15,000 clays and helped raise over \$61,000 for local charities.

Division of Freshwater Fisheries Management

Danon Moxley - Danon has served the Commission for 35 years in regional fisheries management, lake restoration, and for the past 20 years, as the Manager of the Tenoroc Fish Management Area. Managing 7,800 acres to provide hiking, horseback riding, wildlife viewing and world class fishing is Danon's passion. He also worked with an inter-agency team to reclaim much of Tenoroc which was mined for phosphate prior to state ownership. This reclamation has created wetland and other features that provide important wildlife habitat and helps re-connect the upper Peace River system. Danon has forged partnerships with the City of Lakeland and other organizations that support development of the Tenoroc Youth Conservation Center that we are all very excited about.

Paul Thomas - Paul just celebrated 25 years with the agency where his focus is building and maintaining partnerships between communities and natural resource agencies. He has been a member of the Polk County Boating Access Committee since its inception, leading to more and improved boat ramps in a county that has over 550 lakes. Paul's efforts to introduce youth and families to fishing and nature appreciation are amazing. He started the Tampa Bay Urban Fisheries Program in 1990 and has organized hundreds of fishing events that have enjoyed by thousands. Paul has mentored over 60 high school interns from

McKeel Academy in Lakeland enriching their lives and education with his wisdom, compassion, and unique wit.

Division of Habitat and Species Management

Angeline Scotten [pronounced SCOTT-TEN] - Angeline joined the Commission in September of 2012. She serves as one of five Wildlife Assistance Biologists in the Exotic Species Coordination Section of the Division of Habitat and Species Conservation. Her duties include assisting the public with conflict wildlife issues; everything from bears and coyotes to bats and snakes. She is a third generation Floridian and grew up in Jupiter. Angeline graduated from the University of Tennessee in 2009 with her Bachelor of Science degree in wildlife and fisheries management.

Kelle Sullivan [pronounced KELLY] - Kelle serves as a Regional Biologist in the Invasive Plant Management Section of the Division of Habitat and Species Conservation. Kelle is a Florida native from Tampa where she attended the University of South Florida earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Environmental Science and Policy. Kelle is responsible for coordinating and overseeing invasive plant management activities on public water bodies in Highlands County. Kelle works with other FWC staff, government agencies and FWC stakeholders to develop the plant management goals and objectives for these waters. She works out of our Bartow office and has been with the Invasive Plant Management Section since 2008.
